We will cooperate with the Moldovan city of Hincesti

Mayor of Tomaszow Mazowiecki, Mr Marcin Witko and the mayor of the Moldovan city of Hincesti Mr Alexandru Botnari signed a letter of intent on cooperation between local governments. Both Cities wish to implement joint projects in such areas as economic development, promotion and culture.

Topics of these meetings were related to international cooperation between regions and experiences related to the course of democratic processes and economic development in Poland and Moldova through the prism regions of Hincesti and Tomaszów Mazowiecki. The visit was prepared by Mr Pavel Scura, Honorary Consul of Moldova in Poland.

Hincesti is a city in central Moldova, situated on the banks of river Cogilnic. It is the capital of Hincesti region.

Mr Marcin Witko, Mayor of Tomaszow Mazowiecki says:

It was a very short visit, but we have been expecting a concrete benefits. We hope, that soon, we will host a delegation from Hincesti in our city and we will sign a partnership agreement. Moldova is a very beautiful country, not so rich in material resources but very rich in human potential. We have met many wonderful Moldovans with whom we want to work in the areas of economics, culture or promotion. I find them very open, friendly and accommodating to Polish people.
